It specifically draws attention to inequalities of power and how they manifest in institutional arrangements and systemic inequities that further the interests of some groups at the expense of others in the distribution of material

goods, social benefits, rights, protections, and opportunities. Social justice is always a process and can never be fully achieved." (p. 225)

"Social justice is educating ourselves and others and taking action to change the status quo. Social justice is about giving voice to communities who have been forced into silence; social justice is about equity and equal access. Social justice is about destroying systematic marginalization and privilege."
